We, the students of Osawatomie High School, live busy lives. During the school year we participate in many activities which we would like to remember through the years.





The contest began October 18 and was concluded October 30. The success of this contest can be contributed to the cooperation and hard work of each class.












### Stuco Upheld School Tradition






### School Personnel Directed By Mr. York


### The Mind Learned

If these students have learned their skills well, they will have more useful and satisfying lives in the years to come.





for bundle days as additional projects.


The Kayette Choir sang Christmas carols at the city schools and participated in other Kayette programs.







The Kays' activities ranged from the purchase of a popcorn machine, which they used during the basketball season, to cleaning the school grounds of all papers and waste.




# TROJANS MET CHALLENGE OF TRYING SEASON

### TROJANS HAD 9-10 SEASON










# Trojans Show Skill But Lack Depth In Events

The Spring track season proved to be one of disaster for establishing records at O. H. S. this year. The upper classmen squad contained only one senior and two junior lettermen lending support. This left Coach Steele with the problem of developing the remaining participants to carry the burden of the season.

The Trojans opened their season by participating in the Manhattan State Indoor meet with complete defeat. They journeyed to Ottawa where the team brought in one point with the 880 relay team consisting of Dean Spears, Claude Williams, Don Byers, and Nolan Craven. The B-Team took part in a meet at St. Joseph.

On April 10 the cinder squad showed fair promise with the accumulation of 15 1/2 points in the Paola Relays. Spears placed second in the 1/2 mile, while Craven was awarded second in the 100 yard dash and third in the 220 yard dash. The 880 yard relay team tied for first. The Trojan team went ahead to participate in the relays at Olathe, Iola, Fort Scott, and Baker. They also participated in a quadrangular at Paola and finished the season at the Regional Tournament in Fredonia.

With the experience of the returning varsity and the support of the upcoming Freshmen, next season promises to bring more action by the Trojans. 
### Divot Diggers Fall In '64 Season
